UNTERM

UNTERM is a multilingual terminology database maintained by United Nations duty stations and regional commissions. It is a linguistic tool on terminology and nomenclature in subjects relevant to the work of the United Nations. There are over 85,000 entries in the six UN official languages, and there are also entries in German and Portuguese. For more information, see unterportal.un.org.

THE UNITED NATIONS FLAG CODE

The United Nations Flag was adopted as the official emblem of the United Nations by the General Assembly on 7 December 1946. The use of the flag is regulated by the United Nations Flag Code, which outlines protocol when the United Nations flag is to be on display generally, in military operations and in mourning. Whenever the flag is flown, the flag code should be reviewed. For more information, type *United Nations Flag Code* into any on-line search engine.
